Adequate CTE exposure and information is necessary for successful recruitment of non-traditional students. To that end, we hired a CTE Specialist (January 1, 2021) who brings a strong background in work with special populations. He is now a permanent member of the CCC Strategic Enrollment team where he is collaborating with this team to initiate a "larger and more CTE-aware" recruitment effort.

Data shows that students are more likely to explore non-traditional careers while in virtual reality. In support of that, we have used Perkins funding to invest in virtual reality "Career Exploration" software that our CTE specialist has shared with over 90 students across Coconino County with a specific focus on rural schools such as Tuba City and Grand Canyon.

We also purchased and populated a CTE tri-fold portable display that highlights areas within CTE that the CCC enrollment team now regularly shares at their recruitment events. The display includes images of non-traditional students (e.g., a female Wildland Firefighter student and a male Nursing student). We also developed a CTE-specific recruitment PowerPoint that encourages students to consider all the options available to them. This ppt has been presented to eight schools across Coconino County and made available to 15 other schools. An outcome of this work has been an observation that a majority of the students were not aware of CCC certificates and fast-career credential options, only degree options. Finally, as part of our CTE Assist Program that our CTE Specialist leands, we have been able to support 13 non-traditioal students in applying for funding to complete industry certification exams related to their coursework.
