

The CCC Center in Page brought back a Certified Nursing Assistant program last year, and Jewel Benson enrolled.

Gillson chose CCC to continue his education because of the affordability, the proximity to home, and CCC's relationship with NAU. He plans to join the CCC2NAU program next semester, which helps students save money while reaching their educational goals both at CCC and NAU.

Lisa Black

Flagstaff resident Lisa Black is a single mother of two children, ages 17 and 11. On the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program, she needed a job - a good job.

"I want to do something I love," she said, "And driving's something I love."

So, when she heard about a new program at CCC in partnership with the Phoenix Truck Driving School, which trains people to get a commercial driver's license, she was interested. Four weeks later, she passed all her tests, and she's putting in applications to be a commercial truck driver.

"It means a lot," Black said of her new Class A CDL. "Financial stability for my family and me – that's the main thing."
